Off Grid & Battery Capacity.

As well as being your Editor, I am also a Senior Electronics Engineer working in all thing nuclear. Some I can tell you about, and some I can't. I have been intending to add a little technical section to Pickets Post for a while. As we are light on content for this edition (yes - you know I keep nagging for content!) I thought I would write a small article on battery capacity. Batteries of course are a necessity for us when camping 'off-grid'. The term 'off-grid' simply means that we are not connected to mains services - e.g. gas, water, or as in the context of the article I am writing here, electricity.

Did you know that all most everything in your caravan or motorhome runs off 12V - even if you are on electricity?

There are of course a few exceptions, mainly your fridge, water heater and heating system, and maybe a single ring on your hob. That said, the first two can also be run from gas *and* 12V, as can a gas hob. What do you need to make this happen? The simple answer is a 12V supply. Where do we get this from? Another simple answer, a battery. Not all batteries are the same and that will be covered in another article.

If you have a leisure battery, you can go off-grid. What determines how long you can stay off grid? The capacity of the battery, and, how much of that capacity you use over time.

Go and have a look at your battery - you should see an 'Ah' rating on it's label. Note this number down.

A typical leisure battery may have a capacity of one-hundred Amp hours - written as 100Ah (Amp, shortened from Ampere is the unit of current). Theoretically this means you could draw 100A at 12V for one hour, or 10A at 12V for ten hours, or 1A at 12V for one hundred hours. See how it works?

Unfortunately, it's not quite that simple! You cannot completely discharge a typical lead acid leisure battery to 0V as it would be irreparably damaged. More about that in a later article. As a typical rule of thumb a 100Ah battery has about a 50% usable capacity - so about 50Ah.

Question - What's a Watt?


Answer - The Watt is the unit of power.

To work out how long you can run off grid for you need to know four factors. These are Voltage (V), Current (A), Power (W), and time (h). Luckily you know one, and we can *assume* it is always constant. This is the voltage, and for the purposes of this article will shall fix that at 12V.

Now, let's head back to school and introduce a formula, noting that current is represented by the letter I:

 $P = V \times I$ or Power = Voltage x Current

Don't be afraid - take a look at the next page. It's time to draw a silly triangle...



Whoa! What does this mean? Using the cover-up rule, I can find out either my power, current, or voltage by multiplying or dividing the other two factors.

Do you have LED lighting? Let's assume you do and that one of your LED bulbs has a rated power of 6W (you typically find the power rating of an appliance on a ratings plate attached to it, or maybe from the box if you have bought a light bulb for example.

To find the current, we shall use the centre triangle and cover up what we want to find - so in this case, put your finger over the I. To find the current, this tells us we have to divide P by V. Lets put some numbers in for our 6W LED example from above:

$$I = P/V = 6W/12V = 0.5A$$

Now, let's turn on two of our LED bulbs to see how much current we draw. $2 \times 0.5A = 1A$. Pretty simple? Let's turn four bulbs on. $4 \times 0.5A = 2A$.

Remember our battery? Earlier I stated a useable capacity of 50Ah - so we could draw 50A for one hour. If in the example above we turned two LEDs on, which consumed a current of 1A, our battery could last for 50 hours. With four turned on it could last 25 hours.

BUT, and this is a big BUT, we don't (intentionally) leave the lights on all of the time. If our four LEDs, and *only* our four LEDs, were used for five hours a day, our battery would last for five days of off-grid camping.

You do need to remember though that there is *always* a draw from the leisure battery. The fridge when running on gas uses the 12V system for its control electronics, as does the boiler. The screens for your controllers (Truma, Alde) use the 12V system. The radio - yes the one fitted but the one hardly anyone uses - uses the 12V system. Do you leave your TV in standby? Are you using a WiFi router? Is your phone on charge? All of these other uses contribute to what is called 'parasitic drain' - the drain to the 12V system that you can't see.

In my next article, I'll discuss solar panels and how they return capacity to your battery, allowing you to run for longer off-grid.

Easter was always to Beech where we first met our DA member Christine Cole and camped annually with her parents, Brenda & Harold. What a pleasure it has been to meet up with her again since moving to Poole. Ann still loves the camping life and has her own tent etc. We progressed to a caravan eventually and are still enjoying the occasional outing. Since Brian's major surgery in 2019 followed by lockdown for Covid, we do not venture out frequently as it is very difficult to get our van out of our back garden, pushed along the entrance until it is wide enough to turn the van to attach to the car. As we are now both 80+ this task gets harder year on year.

I enjoy the work I do for the DA and will miss not being so active. We do need to replace me as secretary so any offer to become Secretary please let me know.

Going back to my roots, my favourite food was always, and still is, a Yorkshire Curd Tart.



I hear you say what is that? Well best described as a pastry case filled with a curd mixture. Curds (as in the nursery rhyme, curds and whey) are made from curdling the raw milk (can't make it with pasteurised milk!) Hang in muslin to let all the whey drip off leaving the solids called curds. Add to this butter, sugar and currants then place in the pastry case and bake. A little nutmeg can be sprinkled on the top to add to the taste. Cool and eat. Will keep for 3-4 days.


